NEW YORK ARBOR DAY APRIL 29, 2022



The first Arbor Day was celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872, thanks to a resolution proposed by Nebraska City, Nebraska resident J. Sterling Morton. Morton, a civic leader, agriculturist, and former newspaper editor, urged Nebraskans to "set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit." The tree-planting holiday was so popular that by 1920 more than 45 states and U.S. territories annually celebrated Arbor Day. Today it is observed in all 50 states and in many countries around the world.

This is a perfect time to remind you of the benefits of trees:

- Trees clean our air by absorbing common air pollutants.
- Trees improve water quality by reducing rainwater runoff and erosion.
- Trees provide shade that protects us from the sun's UV rays.
- Trees provide important habitat for birds and other wildlife.
- Tree rings provide information about historical climate that is not available from scientific records.

New York's state tree is the **Sugar Maple, a tree** known for producing syrup. Learn about other tree species and get practical advice on which trees to plant in New York's temperature zone by checking out the Arbor Day Foundation's Hardiness Zone Map at <u>arborday.org</u>.

4-H HORSE PROJECT JUNE 1ST DEADLINE

1. 4-H Horse Certificate – must be received by 4-H office for each equine by JUNE 1st of the current year. This form must be signed by the 4-H'er, their parent/guardian and 4-H leader to be considered received and completed.

2. <u>Coggins Certificate</u> – A current copy of the Coggins certificate for the horse(s) being shown during the 4-H year must be submitted to the Extension office by June 1st for any rider to be eligible to ride/show at all 4-H events. A legal Coggins must have a statement by the veterinarian that defines some identifying mark or feature for your horse, distinct from any other horse.

"Calendar Year" is Jan. 1-Dec. 31st.

2021-2022 calendar years accepted.

- 3. Rabies Certificate 2022 a current copy of the Rabies certificate for the horse(s) being shown during the year must be submitted to Cooperative Extension by June 1st for a rider to be eligible to ride/show at all 4-H events.
- **4.***Riding Levels all riders must have a riding evaluation completed before riding in any 4-H Horse event for the project year. (TBA).

RECIPES OF THE MONTH

ZUCCHINI BREAD WITH WHOLE WHEAT PASTRY FLOUR



3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups grated Zucchini

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cup all-purpose flour $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cup whole wheat pastry flour 1 teaspoon Salt

2 teaspoons cinnamon ½ cup raisins (optional)

// cup raisins (Optional)

½ cup chopped walnuts

Directions:

- 1. Lightly grease and flour a 9 x 5 loaf pan
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, beat eggs lightly.

 Add sugar, oil, zucchini & vanilla and beat.
- In a separate bowl, measure dry ingredients and stir to combine. Add nuts and raisins if desired.
- 4. Add dry ingredients to the egg mixture. Stir just until all ingredients are moistened.
- 5. Spoon into loaf pan.
- 6. Bake at 325 degrees F. for 50 minutes. (to test for doneness by inserting a toothpick in the center. It should come out dry.
- 7. Allow loaf to cool 5 to 10 minutes before turning out onto a cooling
- 8. Serve warm or allow to cool before slicing Serving size: -slice /16 servings

SPRING GREEN SALAD

Ingredients:

6 oz. spinach (7 cups)

3 oranges

1 ½ cup strawberries

l cup walnut pieces

Dressina:

l tsp. sugar

1/3 tsp paprika

2 tbsp. orange juice

1 tbsp. lemon juice

1 ½ tsp vinegar

1 tsp onion chopped fine

2 tbsp. salad oil

<u>Materials:</u> paring knife, cutting board, mixing bowls, measuring spoons and cups, jar or blender. Instructions:

- Wash & dry spinach, tear into pieces and chill
- To prepare orange, cut off ends and peel and white part (pith) of outer orange. Using a paring knife, gently cut out sections from membrane edges. You end up with orange sections with no outer membrane.
- 3. To make dressing; combine all ingredients in a jar and shake well or blend in a blender.
- 4. Right before serving, toss orange and strawberries with walnuts and spinach. Add dressing to coat salad and serve.



PEPPER PIZZA

4 English Muffins, split and toasted

l cup tomato sauce

l bell pepper chopped

½ tsp. Garlic powder 1 tsp. oregano

½ cup shredded low fat Mozzarella cheese

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees
- 2. Place English muffin halves on a baking sheet
- 3. Top each muffin half with 2 tablespoons tomato sauce.
- 4. Divide chopped pepper evenly on top of the sauce
- 5. Sprinkle each pizza with garlic & oregano
- 6. Top each pizza with 1 tablespoon of cheese
- 7. Bake for 10-15 minutes and slightly brown
- 8. Refrigerate leftovers.

FAIR OPPORTUNITIES

Junior Supers are 4-H age 10-18 and will receive a premium. Supers must have greater knowledge of 4-H and how the county fair operates. You will need to be available a minimum of 12 hours during fair, so that you can organize the area when exhibits are brought in, working with the judge's assistants, making sure the judge has what they need and work closely with the area superintendent.

<u>Judges' Assistants</u> are 4-H'ers at least 8 years old and willing to help judge during the judge processing the 4-H youth building. This mostly includes bringing exhibits to the judge to be evaluated, helping with the comment sheets, ribbons, entry cards and returning them back to their location.

PREPARING FOR 2022 ~ CORTLAND YOUTH JUNIOR FAIR FAIR DATE: JULY 5-9TH, 2022

YOUTH EXHIBITOR AGE FOR SHOWING AT THE JR. FAIR:

CLOVERBUDS: (youth ages 5 - 8 years of age): **if child turns 8 years old - after** January 1, 2022, the child is still considered as a Cloverbud for the fair and other 4-H programs and must be an enrolled member of the Cortland Co.4-H. Cloverbuds will receive recognition with ribbons only.

A CLOVERBUD is allowed to show - (1) one animal (per species). The animals are required to be housed the duration of the fair week

Cloverbuds show animals -species specified:

- Dairy cattle Spring Calf only
- Sheep; Dairy Goat; Meat Goat: animal must be younger than (1) one year of age.
- Poultry, Rabbit, Cavy all breeds allowed.
- Horses: Leadline and/or Walk-Trot classes only.

(Beef - Swine and/or Market Animals are not allowed to be shown by Cloverbuds)

4-H YOUTH: Who are (8) eight years old and have not passed their (19) nineteenth birthday as of January 1, 2022; and enrolled into Cortland Co. 4-H member to be able to show in animal shows.

CLASSIFICATIONS:

First Year Shower: (in all animal classes) – youth participating in their first ever showing at the fair within the animal shows.

Junior: ages 8-13 Senior: ages 14-19

OWNED VS NON-OWNED:

OWNED: the animal is registered in the youth's name to be shown.

NON-OWNED: the animal is leased to the youth who does not own (to note that a <u>youth cannot own</u> and still intend to also show a non-owned animal in the same species.

Example: you cannot show an owned beef and a non-owned beef - **but** if the youth does plan to show an owned beef; and a non-owned sheep that is okay.

MARKET CLASS: NO NON-OWNED ANIMALS

4-H Move-In Day for Animals to Dairy Cattle Barn: (Beef, Dairy Cattle, Swine) To respect Dairy Classic Show families who are moving out of the barn and clean-up process; 4-H Fair youth will be able to move in on Monday evening, July 4th after 7PM to be on-site and in-place as required by Tuesday evening at 6PM for the start of the fair.

4-H Move-In for Animals to the Ag. Corp Barn: (meat goats, dairy goats,) 4-H Fair youth will be able to move in on Monday evening, July 4^{th} after 7PM to be on-site and in-place as required by Tuesday evening at 6PM for the start of the fair. (rabbits, cavies, & poultry- must be in place on Tuesday 10AM).

ANIMAL SHOW TIMES:

ANIMALS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED WITH THE 4H OFFICE NO LATER THAN JUNE 1ST

The 4-H office will provide on-line link(s) by species to register your animal for the fair.

This is important so that we can provide proper housing and show catalogs for printing. As the fair gets closer the 4-H office will send out reminders.

Release of animals and still exhibits: Sunday, July 10th, 2022 – 6AM-8AM

Ownership of Animal Exhibits: All animal entries must be OWNED and REGISTERED BY JUNE 1ST with the 4-H office. The 4-H office will provide links by species/breeds to complete your entries.

Market Animals: If the 4-H youth member is planning to show Market Turkeys and/or Broilers at the fair this year the 4-H office provides and places the orders for both. In the January/February 2022 "Clover Dispatch" newsletter provides contact information to place your order for Market Turkeys in January and Market Broilers in March. This ensures that all poultry is same age and flock species for market analysis for each member who will be showing and marketing their birds at the auction on Friday evening.

VALID HEALTH CERTIFICATE:

Please make sure you have all documents ready for check-in with the Vet.

- <u>Dairy Cattle</u> BVD-PI must be done and recorded on the registration certificate or veterinarian certificate.
- <u>Pullorum Testing (Birds)</u> <u>after 4/18/22 thru 7/16/22</u> (the 4-H office will also contact for a night of testing at the fairgrounds if the birds have not been blood tested) more information and date will be announced.
- Horses: EIA and Coggins test: dated calendar year 2021 or 2022 and rabies must be 2022.-
- No Stallions and horses must be 24 mos. or older.

RABIES: a valid certificate dated by veterinarian. Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA Licensed vaccine available and that are **4 Months of age or older on the date of admission to the fair.**

- NON-MARKET ANIMALS: vaccination must be done on/before 6/21/2022;(goats and swine will use off-label vaccination due to USDA license not available. (Exception to the rule for rabies vaccination is the small, caged animals, i.e., poultry, rabbits, cavy that are 3 mos. of age/older- entered the fair shows.
- MARKET ANIMALS: vaccination must be done on/before 6 /10/2022 (No Non-owned animals).

GUIDELINES MARKET CLASSES AND SALE

WEDNESDAY, JULY 6TH-REQUIREMENTS

- 1. An exhibitor may show up to TWO head per species in the market class.
- 2. Animals in the market class that make desirable market quality as determined by the judge, have the option to be sold at the market sale on Friday evening.
- **3. Swine**, youth may only sell one (1) animal in the Market sale.
- 4. Youth have the option to sell their market animals in the sale until Thursday morning by 10:00 a.m. Once Sale info is printed, animals being sold are final.
- 5. All market animals are to be weighed in on Tuesday evening –6PM in order Swine, Sheep, Meat Goat and Poultry. (Please do not feed or water before weighing, so that the correct class assigned based on its weight).
- **6.** A commission of 4% of the gross sale amount for animals sold will be charged.
- 7. Each exhibitor should have at least *two (2) buyers* at the sale for their market animals.
- 8. Removal of sale animals is to be agreed upon by buyer and seller.
- 9. 4-H'ers must registered their animals with the 4-H office by June 1st!
- **10.** A youth must attend at least l(one) mandatory educational event during the 4-H year prior to the fair.
- 11. Market Sale Checks will be sent to Exhibitor(s) in the mail after fair week.

All Animals will be weighed in on Tuesday evening starting at 7PM - Weight-In Schedule will be posted

This year's livestock auction is scheduled for Friday, July 8th at 6:00pm as part of the Cortland County Jr Fair.

All market sale participants will be required to:

- sign a contract
- keep and hand in a record sheet
- attend YQCA training,
- take part in a marketing campaign (TBD)
- bring two buyers to the livestock auction on July 8th and sell their animals at the market sale.

MARKET ANIMALS - SPECIES REQUIREMENTS:

MARKET TURKEY:

- Mkt Turkey Showmanship is Wednesday, July 6th
 @ 11:00 a.m. Exhibitor must be present.
- Market Turkey must be owned & under care of exhibitor since received through the order by 4-H.
- The Turkey should weigh no less than 15 pounds. There is no maximum weight. The birds will be weighed at fair on <u>Tuesday evening</u>.
- Health requirements must be met.
- Each Exhibitor may only show ONE Market Turkey (either Hen or Tom).
- **Up-to-date Project Records are mandatory** and must be turned into the 4-H office no later than Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10:00 a.m.

MEAT GOAT:

- The market kid MUST BE owned & under the care of exhibitor by June 1st of the current year.
- All meat goat market kids are required to have their kid's teeth.
- Doe kids or wethers are allowed to show in market kid class. (If showing a doe kid in Market class; they are not allowed to show this animal in the breed classes).
- No buck kids in the market kid class.
- Rabies vaccination must be done (30 days prior) to the fair – see Health Regulations
- Scrapie tag # will be retained on file in CCE office after sale of market animals.
- **Up-to-date Project Records are mandatory** and must be turned into the 4-H office no later than Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10:00 a.m.

LAMB:

- The Market Lamb MUST BE owned & under the care of exhibitor by June 1st of the current year.
- All Market Lambs are required to have their lamb's teeth.
- All Market Lambs must be "shorn" at least 4-6 weeks prior to fair.
- No Ram lambs in the market class.
- Market Lamb must weigh between 85-150 lbs. to be eligible for Market class.
- Lambs weighing in less than 85 lbs. will be assigned to feeder class.
- Rabies vaccination must be (done 30 days prior) to fair - see Health Regulations
- Scrapie tag number will be retained on file in CCE office after sale of animal.
- **Up-to-date Project Records are mandatory** and must be turned into the 4-H office no later than Saturday, Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10:00 a.m.

MARKET BROILER:

- Mkt. Broiler Showmanship Wednesday, July 6th @
 10:00 a.m. Exhibitor must be present.
- An exhibitor may show <u>one of the three birds</u> in showmanship class.
- Only one (pen of 3) market broiler cockerels can be entered into the Market Class.
- Market Broilers must be owned and under care of exhibitor since received through the order by
 4-H Office.
- Animals cannot be entered in both market and breeding classes.
- The pen must be a combined weight of at least twelve# to be sold.
- Health requirements must be met.
- Up to date Project Records are mandatory and must be turned into the 4-H office on Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10:00 a.m.

BEEF:

- The 4-H office MUST BE NOTIFIED in writing by January 1 of current year of exhibitor's intent to show.
- Market animal must be under the care and supervision of the exhibitor for a minimum of 180 days prior to entry date.
- Market Beef animals should be less than 24 months of age, with no more than one set of permanent teeth.
- Steers weighing less than 1000 lbs. will be assigned to feeder class, (not eligible to sell at the market sale).
- Rabies vaccination must be done 30 days prior to fair
 see Health Regulations.
- **Up-to-date Project Records mandatory** and be turned into the 4-H office no later than Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10am.

SWINE:

- Market Hog must be owned and under care of exhibitor by June 1st of current year & registered with the 4-H office.
- An exhibitor may show up to TWO head per species in the market class but will only sell (1) one in market sale.
- Animals in the market class that do not make the grade will not be sold.
- Market Hogs may be divided into four groups: Light, Medium, or Heavy Weight.
- Overweight hogs will be eligible for the Market Sale.
- Feeder, Intermediate will not be eligible for the Market Sale.
- Rabies vaccination must be done (30 days prior) to fair - see Health Regulations
- **Up-to-date Project Records mandatory** and be turned into the 4-H office no later than Saturday, July 9th, 2022 10:00 a.m.

4-H Youth Building: will be open for still exhibits on Friday, July 1st from 4-6 p.m.

and will re-open on Tuesday, July 5th at 8am
