
Reminder for Public Presentations. A gas card was sent to the Brown family to help with travel expenses for their family is going through hard medical times. Next meeting is March 27^{th} .

GETTING READY FOR FAIR WEEK CONTESTS AND PROJECTS IN THE 4-H YOUTH BUILDING

GENERAL GUIDELINES

SECTIONS 15-32 in the 4-H Youth Building:

The youth building will display exhibits that were made, constructed or grown by any youth, ages 5 to 19, of Cortland County.

<u>CLOVERBUDS</u> - Any youth between the ages 5-8, who have not turned 8-years old as of January 1st of the current fair year. Cloverbud will use Yellow Entry Cards and Voucher Sheets and will receive yellow participation ribbons only.

<u>"4-H YOUTH"</u> - Any youth must be 8-years old (as of January 1st up to 19 years of age. White Voucher forms and double entry cards will be used.

- All exhibits will be exhibited by labeled project area in the 4-H building.
- Every exhibit in the 4-H Youth Building will require both sides of entry card completed. Entries may be marked down one placing if cards are not complete.
- <u>Cloverbuds</u> may dictate the entry card to complete both sides.
- **Double Entry Cards**: White, Green or Yellow will be

- used for all non-animal exhibits (as noted in each section).
- An exhibit may not be entered in more than one contest or class.
- More than one article may be entered in a class, provided it is made from different patterns or instructions, unless otherwise specified.
- All exhibits in the Youth Building are eligible for State Fair, unless stated otherwise in the class description.
- ALL NON-PERISHABLE EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE – WITH ENTRY CARDS ATTACHED AT 12:30 P.M. TUESDAY JULY 5th (does not, cut flowers or vegetables).
- <u>Release Time for exhibits</u> 6-8:00 a.m. Sunday, July 10, 2022.

SPECIAL CONTESTS - SECTION 15:

4-H CLUB DISPLAYS: (Pink Entry Card)

Club Displays must be set up and on display in the 4-H Youth building on Tuesday, July 5th at 12:30PM.

You will be judged on - showcase the work of your 4-H Club. You may use it to spotlight a special project, a community service effort, promote 4-H to the public, or raise awareness of any specific area in which your club is working.

The idea is for clubs to provide interesting and informative displays that highlight the variety of opportunities available and to demonstrate that 4-H Connects Kids to Cornell! Youth and the clubs should also incorporate text to help fairgoers understand what 4-H Youth Development is about.

4-H CLUB BANNERS:

(Pink Entry Card) - What is a 4-H Club banner?

- Size: (2' x 4' minimum) designed to hang vertically or horizontally or to be carried horizontally.
- A 4-H Club banner must be made of fabric, or a
 material that will hang, and can be 1 or 2 sided but
 only the design on one side of the banner will be
 judged.
- A Club must indicate which side of the banner they would like judged. Any assembly technique may be used. Designs may be painted glued or sewn, however all decorations and lettering on the banner must be securely fastened.
- Banners may not be commercially made and must

- be made in the current 4-H year. Banners should be a work of the 4-H club members.
- The club's name must be visible on the banner.
- A banner must be completed and equipped with a dowel and yarn, or rope tied on the dowel for hanging.
- A banner can carry words, pictures and messages to be shared with others, and must include the 4-H clover (used appropriately).
- A 4-H banner allows clubs to make statement and express their feeling about 4-H involvement by emphasizing, joining 4-H, a project, benefits of involvement in the local club, Cortland County 4-H or 4-H in general.
- One-entry per 4-H club. (State Fair eligible)
 Banners will be judged based on creativity,
 neatness, attractiveness, and unique
 representation of the 4-H Club.

CLOVERBUD ANIMAL POSTER CONTEST:

(yellow entry card) In place on Tuesday, July 5th 12:30 p.m. - The goal of this poster contest is to allow Cloverbuds opportunity to learn about domesticated animals. The learning process can be through books, field trips, on-line websites, interviewing people knowledgeable about the animal, or their individual experiences.

Cloverbuds are to exhibit a poster illustrating information they have learned this year about a particular animal. A Cloverbud may exhibit one poster on one animal category. Examples of topics can include, but not limited to, breeds, how to care for, similarities/differences between breeds or species, costs to raise, body parts, uses of the animal (i.e., sheep's wool, goat milk, cheese, or meat), identification, or interesting facts.

(*Categories include* Cats, Cows, Dogs, Goats, Horses/Ponies, Poultry, Guinea Pigs, Rabbits, Sheep, or Swine).

ALL CLOVERBUD POSTERS MUST MEET THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS:

- **Poster dimensions** 14" by 22" (half of a standard 22" by 28" poster board).
- Poster must be made and displayed horizontally; meaning the 22" side is horizontal.
- CB Animal Posters will be hung at fair with clips on the top corners—keep that in mind when designing your poster.
- Poster Board Color: You may use any color poster board you think would look good for your poster.
- Mounting Adhesives: Glue sticks that dry clear work well. Double-stick tape works in some cases.
 Do not use white liquid glue because it wrinkles the paper and is too messy.
- Poster Title: Center the title at the top of your poster.

4-H JR. IRON CHEF CONTEST

(pink card entry)

Do you like to cook? If so, do we have a contest for you! The Jr. Iron Chef Contest is a team challenge for 4-H age youth (age 8 and up) who work together to prepare a healthy and tasty recipe. Limit – 6 teams

- The challenge focuses on creating a fun atmosphere where teams participate in a friendly challenge to create the best recipe using optimal kitchen and team practices.
- Food is provided and includes the added challenge of some mystery ingredients! Teams may be made up of either 3 or 4 participants, and there must be an adult coach for each team.
- Evaluators talk with and assess teams to provide a final evaluation based on overall taste, presentation, healthy/nutritious choices, floor skills (e.g., sanitary and safe), teamwork, and verbal presentation.

OLD FASHIONED PIE BAKING CONTEST

(pink entry card – Cloverbuds use yellow entry card) In place on Tuesday, July 5th 12:30 p.m. is open to those interested in highlighting their pie baking skills and talents.

AGE DIVISIONS: ([r. 8-12) (Sr. 13-19)

All pies must be baked. - FRUIT PIES ONLY, no cream, custard or meringue pies. No cream cheese icing or fillings.

- Each pie will be a double crust, single crust, or lattice/decorative top.
- Each pie will be in an 8 inch or 9inch disposable pan, placed in jumbo or 2.0 Gallon zip- lock plastic bags, or covered with clear wrap.
- All entries must be made from scratch.
- Pre-made store bought crusts or fillings are not permitted.

Pie Judging will be based on:

- 1. Overall Appearance
- 2. Flakiness, tenderness and flavor of the crust
- 3. Flavor and consistency of the filling Overall flavor of the crust and filling.

DECORATED SUGAR COOKIE OR CUPCAKE CONTEST

(Pink entry card) - (Cloverbuds use Yellow entry) In place on Tuesday, July 5th 12:30 p.m.

3 Age Divisions: (Cloverbuds 5-7) (Jr. 8-12) (Sr. 13-19)

- Each display must include (5) five decorated sugar cookies or cupcakes.
- Only (1) one type of dough/batter/frosting is required, but you may use more than one sugar cookie dough, cupcake batter, and / or frosting recipe for this contest.

- Judging will be on the texture and flavor of the cookie/cupcakes and frosting, as well as the quality and originality of the decoration.
- Cookies or cupcakes must be placed together on a paper plate inside a clear plastic bag. All decorations must be edible.
- No purchased frosting, it must be homemade
- Recipes are required for the cookie dough or cupcake batter, and for the icing.
