NEW YORK ARBOR DAY APRIL 26, 2019



The first Arbor Day was celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872, thanks to a resolution proposed by Nebraska City, Nebraska resident J. Sterling Morton. Morton, a civic leader, agriculturist, and former newspaper editor, urged Nebraskans *to "set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit."* The tree-planting holiday was so popular that by 1920 more than 45 states and U.S. territories annually celebrated Arbor Day. Today it is observed in all 50 states and in many countries around the world.

This is a perfect time to remind you of the benefits of trees:

- Trees clean our air by absorbing common air pollutants.
- Trees improve water quality by reducing rain water runoff and erosion.
- Trees provide shade that protects us from the sun's UV rays.
- Trees provide important habitat for birds and other wildlife.
- Tree rings provide information about historical climate that is not available from scientific records.

New York's state tree is the *Sugar Maple, a tree* known for producing syrup. Learn about other tree species and get practical advice on which trees to plant in New York's temperature zone by checking out the Arbor Day Foundation's Hardiness Zone Map at <u>arborday.org</u>.

<u>All</u> youth that are planning on having a market animal at the Cortland Jr Fair this year must attend one session of this workshop to have consideration to market their animal in the fair auction. All participants will go through Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training, learn how to fill out your project records, how to find and contact your buyers for the sale.

YQCA training is becoming an important component for youth involved in food animal exhibitions, which by definition, these youths are food animal producers. This same youth with knowledge and experience are critical to the success of producing safe and wholesome food products for consumers. This age-appropriate (8-21) program is being offered nationally to ensure youth producers have a foundation of knowledge to provide a higher level of food safety to consumers. Some national animal show entries will begin requiring proof of YQCA certification, and may soon be required for county and state fair.

HORSE STATIONS:

Heads Up! Helmet Safety and Concussion Awareness - *Instructed by Dru Malavase* - We all know to wear **helmets and proper equine footwear**, but this workshop will present information about the why. NYS law tells us to wear a helmet when mounted on a horse if you are under age 18. Regardless of your age, your head is your most valuable body part and it needs protection. Learn to select and fit a helmet, explore styles and other safety research available on concussion **protocols**. Protocols are standard procedures in 4-H to keep you safe.

Donkeys are Different! *Instructed by Erin Goodrich, DVM* - Donkeys and mules are just a few of the equines that you can also "lease" and show in the NYS 4-H program, even if you already own and show another equine. Learn about physical features and behaviors that make donkeys unique in the **Equidae** family. Why do they **bray**? Are they naturally stubborn? What uses do donkeys serve around the world? Learn more about these fascinating and fun creatures from a Cornell donkey expert.

NeighingandWeighing:EquineBodyWeight.Instructed by Katielynn Evans - Too fat, too thin,
or just right? Learn how to study a horse and learn more
about basic feeding management tips to keep your horse in
good condition. Learn more about body condition scoring
methods and walk away with new skills and weight tapes
you can use at home to practice and implement body work
knowledge.

Hammers and Clinchers: Farrier Tools 101. *Instructed by Kav Young* - What do these tools have in common? They help keep horse hooves in good shape. Trimming and balancing of horses' hooves and placing shoes on their hooves is the job of an experienced professional. Learn more from an experienced 4-Her who knows his way around these tools. Learn how to identify some common and unusual tools to help maintain a healthy horse.

All Knotted Up! Instructed by Tammi Jo Swearingen and Sarah Bagley - Do you know the difference between a slip knot and a square knot? Do you know how to tie a quickrelease knot? Learn some new tricks and useful take home skills of haltering and knot tying with an experienced rodeo roper and practical horse woman.

<u>Why is my horse itchy?</u> *Instructed by Julia Miller, DVM* - Did you know that animals need dermatologists too sometimes? Have you ever seen a horse with rain rot, scratches, hives, or just itchiness? In this workshop you'll learn about why the skin is such an important barrier that protects horses from the outside world, what can harm that barrier, and what you can do to keep it safe.



POULTRY STATIONS:

Birds of a Feather... Wait! What about body type, <u>comb, etc....</u> – Meat, Eggs, Fancy and more! Every breed has a unique look and purpose. In this track, we will be learning the different purposes for raising poultry and what breeds fall into each of those purposes. A few of our feathered friends will be joining us to help instruct!

Chicken Anatomy: We're going in! How does a chicken digest it's food? How does it lay an egg almost every day? In this workshop, we will take an exciting look inside a chicken to learn about the digestive and reproductive systems that make them the amazing creatures they are! You will learn how chickens, which don't have teeth like us, grind down their food. You will also learn how the reproductive system is like a factory assembly line, almost always at work to deliver you that next fresh egg! Time to put on your surgery gloves, because we're going in!

Chicken Food: Feeling Peckish? Have you ever wondered what's in chicken food? What do chickens eat for snacks and treats? How can we feed them so that they stay happy and healthy? This workshop will explore the chicken diet, what types of nutrients are necessary, and how these requirements change throughout the layer hen's life. To apply our new knowledge of balanced diets, we will also be measuring out and creating our own nutritious snack mix (but one meant for humans of course!). Let's make some egg-cellent diets.

<u>Coop Costs and other expenses</u> Join an American Poultry Association Judge Apprentice and an experienced teen leader as they share from experience what's needed to raise birds and the costs of keeping birds safe and healthy from chick to chicken.

Biosecurity for Small Flocks -Join our NY avian veterinary specialist and learn about biosecurity, the first line of defense for preventing diseases from entering your farm and spreading among your flock. Dr. Jagne will discuss the necessary measures and practices you need to put in place to protect your flock.

Let's Get Crackin'– Want to learn more about 4-H poultry knowledge and skills competitions and other food prep possibilities in 4-H? Interested in learning more about the world of poultry? Join us for some friendly competitions and an opportunity to act as a *foodie* judge. It is sure to be an egg-citing experience.

1. <u>4-H Horse Certificate</u> – must be received by 4-H office for each equine by **JUNE** 1st of the current year. This form must be signed by the 4-H'er, their parent/guardian and 4-H leader to be considered received and completed.

2. <u>Coggins Certificate</u> – A current copy of the Coggins certificate for the horse(s) being shown during the 4-H year must be submitted to the Extension office by June 1st for any rider to be eligible to ride/show at all 4-H events. A legal Coggins must have a statement by the veterinarian that defines some identifying mark or feature for your horse,

distinct from any other horse. "Calendar Year" is Jan. 1-Dec. 31st.

2018-2019 calendar years accepted.

3. <u>Rabies Certificate</u> – a current copy of the Rabies certificate for the horse(s) being shown during the year must be submitted to Cooperative Extension by June 1st for a rider to be eligible to ride/show at all 4-H events.

4.*<u>Riding Levels</u> – all riders must have a riding evaluation completed before riding in any 4-H Horse event for the project year. (TBA).

4-H CAREER EXPLORATIONS June 25-27, 2019 CORNELL UNIVERSITY

4-H CAREER EXPLORATION: is a three-day event for youth on the Cornell University campus. The purpose of this program is to provide youth with exposure to academic fields and career exploration, to develop leadership skills, to provide hands-on experience in a college setting and to introduce you to Cornell University. The event is made up of two grade specific tracts: University U for youth entering grades 8 - 9 and Focus for Teens for youth entering grades 10 - 12.

UNIVERSITY U Welcomes "U"!! This program offers a series of workshops addressing issues and questions important to "U". This program also offers an introduction to science and technology career opportunities. This past summer, youth involved in the University U program attended six of the following ten tours or workshops: Animal Adventures; Biological Research; Climate Leaders in the Making; Clocks and Codes; Construction of a Crystal Radio; fish PHARM (Bridging the Gap Between Science and Business); Nutritional Artist; and Explorations in Nanotechnology. Participants also have the opportunity to discover Cornell University and the excitement of college

life. **Eligibility requirement: Students entering the 8th and 9th grades (or the equivalent) in the fall of 2018.

FOCUS FOR TEENS is a program where teens spend three-days with a specific department or program at Cornell University. The program allows you to have fun while learning about such topics as astronomy; discovering birds and nature exploration; biomedical and environmental engineering; fossil collecting and paleontology; computer science; food science; geospatial sciences (GPS, GIS, Remote Sensing, UAVs); human development; horticulture; communications; mechanical and aerospace engineering; molecular biology and genetics; making for sustainability technology, community, and agriculture; chemical and bimolecular engineering; and more.

**Eligibility requirement: Teens must be entering their sophomore, junior or senior year of high school (or the equivalent) or freshman year in college in the fall of 2019.



4-H Public Presentations provide a means for young people to practice their speaking and organizational skills in a way that will help make them comfortable and poised in front of an audience. Beginners are encouraged to select simple topics with which they are familiar to make the demonstration process the focus of their effort, without the stress of learning about an unfamiliar topic. As they progress each year, they are challenged to try a more difficult subject and to venture into other presentation styles.

3 eggs	1 ¹ / ₂ cup all-purpose flour
1 cup sugar	1 ¹ / ₂ cup whole wheat pastry
¹ / ₄ cup vegetable oil	flour
1 teaspoon vanilla	1 teaspoon Salt
2 cups grated Zucchini	2 teaspoons cinnamon
	¹ / ₂ cup raisins (optional)

Directions:

- 1. Lightly grease and flour a 9 x 5 loaf pan
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, beat eggs lightly. Add sugar, oil, zucchini & vanilla and beat.
- 3. In a separate bowl, measure dry ingredients and stir to combine. Add nuts and raisins if desired.
- 4. Add dry ingredients to the egg mixture. Stir just until all ingredients are moistened.
- 5. Spoon into loaf pan.
- 6. Bake at 325 degrees F. for 50 minutes. (to test for doneness by inserting a toothpick in the center. It should come out dry.
- 7. Allow loaf to cool 5 to 10 minutes before turning out onto a cooling
- 8. Serve warm or allow to cool before slicing Serving size: 1slice /16 servings
