You ***must have a minimum of (6) business*** meetings a year-the rest that you plan can be field trips, activities etc. You can always do a business meeting every time if that is what you want!

Secretary Reports are due to the 4-H office by the **7th of every month** for the previous month's meeting. By getting your reports in on time, your secretaries are eligible to be chosen as secretary of the month, and one overall for honor secretary of the year. A helpful hint for the beginning of the year: set up a notebook with a personal page or permanent record sheet for each member, and as a project is completed, they can record it there. Are you interested in becoming a strong leader in the 4-H Community and beyond? 4-H Teen Council is a county-wide program that invites youth 13 years old and older to learn about leadership, citizenship, trust, financial management, and fun while meeting new, diverse friends from around the county.

Information about 4-H Teen Council:

- Youth must be at least 13 years of age to join
- 4-H Teen Council is a great place to meet new friends.
- Members can be from any community within Cortland County.
- You can belong to 4-H Teen Council in addition to your regular club.
- 4-H Teen Council meets the first Monday of every month, except July and August.
- 4-H Teen Council controls an annual budget of generally more than \$10,000.
- Members decide how much of the budget they would like to use to subsidize teen council trips, scholarships, community service, and maintenance on the food booth at the fairgrounds.
- Members may participate in as many trips sponsored by Teen Council as they see fit.
- The officers of 4-H Teen Council are elected from within the membership.
- 4-H Teen Council members run the annual 4-H Achievement Night program.
- 4-H Teen Council oversees and raises funds from the 4-H Food Booth at the Cortland Jr Fair, and other events during the year.

RECIPES:

CHRISTMAS SNACK MIX



*A delicious addictive **Christmas Snack Mix** is perfect for the holidays! This snack mix is filled with cereal, pretzels, M&M's, and coated in melted white chocolate.*

Ingredients

- 2 cups corn or rice Chex cereal or other crispy cereal
- 1 cup miniature pretzel twists or pretzel rods
- 2 cups Cap'n Crunch® cereal (with no berries)
- 2 cups Cheerios® or other toasted oat cereal
- 1 cup Christmas (green and red) M&M's
- 1 and 1/2 bags (~3 cups or 16 ounces total) white chocolate chips
- 1 and 1/2 teaspoons vegetable oil or shortening
- Optional: Christmas sprinkles

Directions:

- **Step 1** - Line a large sheet-pan with parchment paper and set aside.
- **Step 2** - In a large bowl combine the Chex cereal, pretzels (**Note 1**), Cap'n Crunch cereal, Cheerios, and M&M's. Mix together, making sure that everything is evenly distributed.
- **Step 3 - WHITE CHOCOLATE:** In a medium-sized microwave-safe bowl, add the white chocolate chips and vegetable oil. Microwave for 30 seconds, stir, and microwave for another 25 seconds. Stir until melted and smooth. If needed, return to the microwave for a little longer. (Heat in bursts of 10 seconds, stirring for 10 seconds in between each burst). Pour the melted and smooth white chocolate over the snack mix.
- **Step 4** - Gently stir until completely combined and all ingredients are coated in white chocolate (work quickly, because white chocolate hardens fast!) and then transfer to the prepared baking sheet and spread into one even layer. If desired, add some Christmas/festive sprinkles before the white chocolate sets.

- **Step 5** - Allow white chocolate to set at room temperature or place in the fridge until firm, about 10-20 minutes. Break into pieces and serve. **Pretzels:** If using miniature pretzel rods, break them in half first!

PEPPERMINT-CHOCOLATE GREEK YOGURT BARK



This eye-catching frozen peppermint-chocolate bark was inspired by Williams Sonoma's Original Peppermint Bark--our loose interpretation of the treat is frozen and made with Greek yogurt, chocolate and crushed candy canes. For the creamiest bark, be sure to use full-fat yogurt, as fat-free yogurt can get icy when frozen. Serve this healthy dessert when you want all those festive holiday flavors in a lightened-up--and totally delicious--package.

Ingredient Checklist

- 12 ounces semisweet chocolate, chopped
- 2 cups whole-milk plain Greek yogurt
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- ¼ cup mini semisweet chocolate chips

- 6 candy canes (3 ounces), crushed into small pieces
- ½ teaspoon coarse sea salt

Directions

- **Step 1** - Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper.
- **Step 2** - Place chopped chocolate in a double boiler over simmering water; heat, stirring often, until melted. (To improvise a double boiler: Bring 1 inch of water to a simmer in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Place chocolate in a medium heatproof bowl that sits above the simmering water.) Pour the melted chocolate onto the parchment-lined pan, spreading it into an even layer about 1/8 inch thick. Refrigerate until the chocolate just begins to set, about 10 minutes.
- **Step 3** - Meanwhile, combine yogurt and vanilla in a small bowl. Drizzle the yogurt mixture over the chocolate, and then lightly spread it in an even layer over the chocolate. Sprinkle with mini chocolate chips, candy cane pieces and salt. Freeze until the yogurt is completely set, about 2 hours. Break into 20 pieces; serve frozen. **Servings:** 10

Tips- To make ahead: Freeze airtight between sheets of parchment paper for up to 2 weeks.
